But I would like to share a few clips from some of the stories to show you what you are providing to these most recent graduates:

"The experience that I have had at TCU Ranch Management has far surpassed what I could have imagined. I have gained an entire new thought process and a tremendous amount of "detailed" information to take with me. RM for me has been a "process" in itself. It has forced me to step out of my comfort zone and submerge myself into a total learning environment. While here I feel that I have not only learned, but I now understand production agriculture and the Cattle Industry in its full realm".

"This program has made me more disciplined and has given me a better work ethic. I have learned just how valuable time is and it has made me a better time manager. I now look at situations and people with a different perspective and a critical mind. It has taught me how to find something good in everything but at the same time find a way to make it better. I have become a better people person and a better communicator. It has taught me to be open to new ideas and that you can learn something from every single person you meet. I have learned it always depends, to know your numbers and do business with people that don't know there's and purple chairs make you fat. I am definitely a better farmer and steward of the land and animals than I was before and I am definitely a better cowboy".

"It is funny how the only people that can respect what you have done are Alumni" This last student comment really does sum up the truth of the RM Program into one statement. It is a true honor to be a part of the TCU Ranch Management Program. I would like to give praise to the forefathers of this program, the financial supporters and the ranch hosts for their part in making the Class of 2009 a great group of TCU RM Alumni.



Lost in Translation

We have been pretty busy since the class of 2009 graduated and left the program. The staff has all been running different directions and working on various projects to get prepared for the new class coming in August. We recently had the privilege of hosting a group of ranchers from Brazil for a chance to learn from one another and visit several ranches in Texas. In order to communicate, we all required the assistance of translators. Something that I found interesting, was the difficulty that the translators encountered when translating certain words that were very common in one language, but not the other.

One such word was the term "steward" as it applies to ranch management. Apparently, there is not a good word to describe a steward in the Portuguese language, spoken in Brazil. They have words for administrator, overseer, and other related words, but not for the concept of a steward. As I think of the difficulty our gifted translators found as they struggled to translate the word, I believe we should constantly remind ourselves of the definition – because we are all stewards. I will spare you the dictionary definition, but a steward can hardly be defined without using the word "manage" or "care." In most cases, a steward works for someone else and is managing or caring for that individual's possessions. This definition holds true for some of the great Bible stories, and is still true in

each of our lives today. A steward also has a passion or drive to complete these duties as best they possibly can.

In the field of ranch management, we are entrusted with land and livestock that we must nurture, maintain, and heal or repair as if each was our own. When in actuality, all of these things are simply in our care for a short time. We are going to leave them behind at some point, and hopefully, in better condition than we took them in.

As the Brazilian group was leaving, both the Texans and the Brazilians expressed appreciation for all that we We also learned from each other. looked forward to learning more from one another in future visits. I believe the concept of stewardship is one of the greatest things that they took back to Brazil with them and it will be an important concept to continue to get across to them in the future. Because. in many ways, the area of Brazil where the ranchers come from, is much like Texas and other parts of the United States were about 150 years ago. If the Brazilians can learn something from our mistakes and the instances of poor stewardship over the past century and a half, the whole world can benefit.
