All Aboard the Ranch Brigade Train

The Ranch Brigade train has left the station, thanks to the many individuals who traveled to the Ranch Management building for the initial planning meeting. This group included representatives from NRCS, AgriLife Extension, retail meat business, animal health industry, TSCRA, ranch real estate, as well as a brokerage/cattle producer, ranch owners, and managers.

I say “Ranch Brigade” but in actuality we did not come to a consensus on the name of the camp. We will decide on a name with more input from you guys. In the meantime, I will throw out the top names being tossed around as possibilities for the planned camp: Ranch Brigade, Beef Brigade, Bovine Brigade, or Cattle Brigade. However, thanks to the entire group we did finalize the mission statement of the camp, which I am very proud of. The Mission Statement is: “Educating and empowering the next generation of resource managers with the skills and knowledge necessary to successfully manage and promote sustainable beef production.” This mission statement puts a dead center target on my passion for reducing sustainable beef production illiteracy.

The discussion in the meeting brought out many good questions such as who would be the ideal student. The ideal student is one that has been exposed to livestock production and has the curiosity and desire to know why we do all that we do in beef production, from conception to the consumer. This led into a great dialogue on what the outcomes of these students should be. This is where we discussed, and started planning for, our next meeting to actually begin writing the camp curriculum. Now here is where you as alumni can help; some specific volunteer needs for the camp would be a cooking crew that could feed 50 to 75 people, a person with marching or military experience for training students to march with cadence, and a facility to hold this camp. The camp facility will need to be able to sleep up to 75 people, have an A/C meeting room for 35, and a large cooking facility.

The committee is still in need of many volunteer industry leaders. Many of you have shown interest in participating in the camp, but could not attend the June meeting. The next meeting is being planned for the first part of August. The date and place is yet to be determined, but if you want to be a part of this awesome ride, or know someone who does, please pass their name on to me.

The Business of Mother Nature

In our business there is always an evolving set of obstacles to deal with concerning Mother Nature. Currently she is throwing a tough set at us that can cause some real problems. The hot dry weather coupled with scorching winds poses a serious threat to our livestock and ranches. I have been receiving calls from producers concerning these problems as they relate to animal health. Many ranches have had to de-stock or resort to moving cows, many of them further north. This is certainly a tough decision to make in itself. Remember, if you relocate cows or restock, keep Trichomoniasis in mind. There is still a tremendous amount of Trichomoniasis out in the country. Wherever you are, you need to be vigilant about your own cows as well as what is across the fence from them. A lot of questions need to be asked when purchasing or moving cows. Also quarantining new purchases is an excellent idea. Bull testing is a must for ranches, along with good records and keeping an eye out for strung out calf crops. Which under current circumstances may not just be caused by nutrition, but could be Trichomoniasis. There are a number of management strategies to help combat Trichomoniasis (e.g. bull testing, vaccination, culling, bio-security), but you need a plan.

Along with the dry weather we will see Vitamin A deficiencies and mineral deficiencies due to lack of adequate forage. Vitamin and mineral deficiencies lead to reproductive

problems (including retained placentas), eye problems, and poor immune systems that often result in respiratory disease. There have been reports of grass tetany caused by low Magnesium levels in Texas cattle moved north to pastures made lush by high rainfall and cool weather. We also need to watch out for dust pneumonia in calves on cows. The dust that calves inhale while following cows, coupled with heat stress, can cause severe respiratory problems. When treating sick calves on cows or lightweight purchased stockers, especially from dry weather situations, do not forget about oral and IV electrolytes to help survival rates in this heat. A good mineral program can also help on these purchased calves with health and electrolyte imbalance. Remember that low water supplies in creeks, rivers, and dirt tanks not only cause problems with bogging down, but lower water volume can concentrate problems such as Lepto. Which can be spread in drinking water.

I hope this information helps as you work with your veterinarian to plan a health program to combat the tough circumstances we are facing. Please call on us here at Ranch Management if we can help in any way. Good luck and keep praying for rain.
