Ph.D. in Experimental Psychology

The Experimental Psychology program provides training in a variety of sub-disciplines within psychology. This includes cognitive psychology, developmental psychology, evolutionary psychology, learning, neuroscience, quantitative methods, and social-personality. The Ph.D. program is also affiliated with the Institute of Behavioral Research and the Karyn Purvis Institute of Child Development. Please be advised that we do not offer graduate-level courses or degrees in clinical or counseling psychology.

As a graduate student in the department, students will receive broad training in experimental psychology and will be able to conduct research in their area of study. Students are matched with a faculty mentor prior to admission, so it is important to explain who you are interested in working with as part of your graduate school application. Admission Requirements:

- Bachelor's or master's degree (psychology degree is preferred but not required)
- Completion of psychology courses strongly suggested, including introductory psychology, experimental psychology (i.e., research methods), and quantitative methods (i.e., statistics)
 - For exceptional students without these courses, contact the <u>program director</u> to determine whether alternative courses are sufficient
- Resume/curriculum vita (CV)
- Statement of purpose
- Three letters of reference
- Writing sample from a psychology course, convention, or presentation that is representative of your writing abilities
- Unofficial transcripts of all colleges attended. (An English translation of all international transcripts is also required)
- International students: Official TOEFL/IELTS scores as evidence of English proficiency. A minimum TOEFL score of 80 (internet-based) or 550 (paper based) is required, or a minimum IELTS score of 6.5
- Graduate application and application fee (\$60)

Application Deadline: January 1 (fall admission)
